# **Opening Letter**

# Dear Friends & Partners,

It is with deep gratitude and pride that we present the 2024–2025 Annual Report for Carlington Community Health Centre. This past year has been one of significant transformation, as we undertook foundational work to become a more connected, integrated, and resilient organization—one better equipped to meet the evolving needs of our community. At the heart of this transformation was a comprehensive organizational review that asked bold questions:

How do we work together?
How do we support our teams?
How do we continue to show up for the community with purpose and impact?

The answers led to thoughtful change: restructuring how we lead, how we share information, and how we serve.

We implemented a new organizational structure, organized around four client-facing program pillars. We also introduced a two-tier leadership model, with a Strategic Leadership Team and an Operational Management Team, to strengthen alignment and focus. Together, these changes have helped break down silos, foster stronger collaboration across departments, and allow us to better meet the complex realities our clients face.

We continued strengthening the Centre's foundations through improvements that support both transparency and responsiveness. Our refreshed external communications strategy better reflects our mission and puts the community at the centre of every interaction. Internally, our new social services dashboard delivers real-time insights to leadership, enabling more strategic alianment and coordination.

Our commitment to innovation and quality care was further demonstrated with the introduction of an artificial intelligence (AI) scribe tool in our clinic—helping reduce administrative burden for clinicians and enhancing the quality of interactions with clients. And our leadership and board governance were strengthened through new strategic planning tools, development sessions, and data dashboards that keep equity and client outcomes at the Centre of every decision.

















In 2024–2025, Carlington CHC also reaffirmed its role as a sector leader. We co-led a joint advocacy campaign with our sister CHCs across Ottawa, pushing for greater investment in community-based models of care and wage equity for our staff. These efforts not only elevated our collective voice, but also deepened partnerships with funders, allies, and health system leaders.

We worked to remain responsive to the community's evolving needs, whether by expanding childcare services—with 15 new daycare spaces for toddlers—or by creating new, inclusive programs like Soup and Support, Stitch and Style Society, and Seniors Arts and Singing. Through it all, we stayed rooted in client-centered, accessible care. In total, more than 4,000 people turned to Carlington CHC this year for support, connection, and care.

None of this would have been possible without the dedication of our staff, the wisdom of our community, the support of our partners, and the guidance of our Board. We are proud of what we have accomplished together, and we remain energized by the work ahead.



# Collective Action in Motion

At Carlington CHC, our work has never been limited to what happens within our walls. True impact happens when we step into the community—alongside partners, neighbours, and changemakers—working together to remove barriers, build capacity, and support health in all its forms.

# **New Initiatives That Expand Possibility**

- · Partners for Housing Solutions: Since January 2024, we've aligned on this committee to advocate for better conditions in Residential Service Homes (RSHs) and supports residents and home operators, focusing on urgent issues and long-term government advocacy for sustainable housing
- Student-led Health Initiative Partnership (SHIP): In partnership with the University of Ottawa's Faculty of Medicine, SHIP engages medical students to support primary care and health promotion in RSHs. A pilot project is assessing residents' needs to improve service connections. The program will continue next year, providing hands-on community learning at Carlington CHC.
- Black Health Committee: In line with the Alliance for Healthier Communities, our Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Committee is leading efforts to better serve the Black community within our catchment area, as seen in our new preventative care strategy.
- Art Drop-In: In partnership with the Ottawa School of Art, our health promotion team offers a space for all community members to gather and express their creativity as way to nurture well-
- Dolly Parton Imagination Library: This program delivers free monthly books to children aged birth to five, promoting literacy and family bonding, especially in low-income families in partnership with Kiwanis Club of Ottawa-West. Since launching locally, 49 children have been enrolled.
- Asset Mapping Software: A digital transformation to support Social Prescribing, developed in collaboration with Digital Health students from Algonquin College.
